Fund Objective

The objective of the portfolio is to provide investors with a regular and stable income that targets inflation beating returns over the long term, while actively managing risk of capital loss in the short term.

Fund Strategy

Investments to be included in the portfolio will, apart from assets in liquid form, consist of equity and non-equity securities, fixed interest instruments (including but not limited to bonds, cash deposits and money market instruments), debentures, preference shares and property securities as well as any other income enhancing securities which are consistent with the portfolio's primary objective and that the Act may allow from time to time. The portfolio's equity exposure will be limited to a maximum of 10% of the portfolio's net asset value. The manager may also include any forward currency, interest rate and exchange rate and exchange rate swap transactions for efficient portfolio management purposes. The portfolio will be managed in accordance with regulations governing pension funds.



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Risk Profile: Conservative

You prefer to receive stable income flows and are determined to keep your capital intact at all times. You understand that comfort means that you may not receive outsize returns but that your capital will be safe — and the likelihood of losing money slim. The portfolio that gives you the most comfort consists primarily of income-oriented asset classes such as cash, nominal and inflation-linked bonds and property. Glossary Terms

Annualised Returns

Annualised return is the weighted average compound growth rate over the period measured

Asset allocation is the percentage holding in different asset classes (i.e. equities, bonds, property, etc.). It is used to determine the level of diversification in a portfolio.

Capital Volatility

Volatility is a measure of 'risk' and refers to the extent to which the price of an investment or capital value fluctuates over a certain period of time. Funds with high volatility usually offer the potential for higher returns over the longer term than low volatility funds.

Cumulative Returns

mulative return is the total growth experienced over the period measured.

Derivatives are instruments generally used as an instrument to protect against risk (capital losses), but can also be used for speculative purposes. Examples are futures, options and swaps.

The income that is generated from an investment and given to investors through monthly, quarterly, bi-annual or annual distribution pay-outs.

Diversification

This is a strategy designed to reduce risk within a portfolio by combining a variety of investments (or asset classes) such as equities, bonds, cash or property, which are unlikely to all move in the same direction at the same time. This is designed to reduce the risk (and protect against capital losses) within a portfolio. Diversification allows for more consistent performance under a wide range of economic conditions as it smoothes out the impact of negative market events. The positive performance of some investments or asset classes should neutralize the negative performance of others

Financial Instruments

Derivatives also known as financial instruments (such as a future, option, or warrants) whose value derives from and is dependent on the change in value of an underlying asset (such as a commodity, currency, or security) to protect against risk (capital losses).

Fund Objective

Fund Strategy
The fund strategy is the way that the fund is managed to achieve the fund objective.

The Information Ratio measures the market risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. The greater a portfolio's Information Ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been compared to the market in general.

Collective Investment Schemes

Collective Investment Schemes (CIS) (also called unit trusts) are portfolios of assets such as equities, bonds, cash and listed property, in which investors can buyunits. They allow private investors to pool their money together into a single fund, thus spreading their risk across a range of investments, getting the benefit ofprofessional fund management, and reducing their costs.

Market Capitalization

Market capitalization is the total value of the issued shares of a publicly traded company; it is calculated by multiplying the share price by the number of shares in issue.

The maximum drawdown measures the highest peak to trough loss experienced by the fund.

When you buy a unit trust, your money is pooled with that of many other investors. The total value of the pool of invested money in a unit trust fund is split into equal portions called participatory interests or units. When you invest your money in a unit trust, you buy a portion of the participatory interests in the total unit trust portfolio. Participatory interests are therefore the number of units that you have in a particular unit trust portfolio.

The Sharpe Ratio measures total risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. It measures the amount of risk associated with the returns generated by the portfolio and indicates whether a portfolio's returns are due to excessive risk or not. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been (i.e. a higher return with a contained risk profile, where the portfolio manager is not taking excessive risk to achieve those returns).

Standard Deviation

Standard deviation (also called monthly volatility) is a measure of how much returns on an investment change from month to month. It is typically used by investors to gauge the volatility expected of an investment.

Portfolio Manager Comment

The Northstar Income fund returned 0.39% vs 0.56% for the STeFI call deposit for the month of October, which proved to be a tough month for all local fixed income assets in the wake of the dreadful medium-term budget policy statement (MTBPS).

The market's worst fears were realised in Gigaba's maiden MTBPS, where it was confirmed: 1) South Africa's debt ratio was expected to blow-out to 60% and not stabilise, 2) debt servicing costs would increase to 14.9% of revenue and 3) and the budget deficit was estimated to increase from 3.1% to 4.3% of GDP. In the absence of a constrained spending plan, the government's continued commitment to funding failed state-owned enterprises and the ongoing political uncertainty and increased policy risk all point to further credit downgrades.

The Rand quickly faded to 14.30 to the US dollar and the local long-dated bond yields crashed through 10% to settle around 10.5%. For the month of October: The All Bond index dropped -2.3%, longer dated bonds -2.7%, the listed preference share index -1.4% and the South African inflation linked bond index down -0.6%. The SA listed property index was spared with a positive return of 2.0%, with companies generating offshore revenue benefiting from a 4% weakening of the Rand vs. the US dollar.

The strongest contributors to returns for the month included the portfolio's 7.2% holdings in foreign currencies (which was increased prior to the MTBPS), Redefine international and the 45% holding in a broad range of floating rate notes with an average spread of 173bps above 3m Jibar. Detractors to performance included the 31% exposure to fixed bonds, with yields rising 54bps on average during the month and the portfolio's 1.5% holdings across Redefine, SA Corporate Real Estate and Hyprop which detracted 2.2bps.

Over the next couple of months we expect market conditions to become increasingly volatile in the lead up to the ANC's 54th national conference which takes place between the 16th and 20th of December, the imminent credit rating updates and the 2018 budget speech in February next year.

In light of these dynamics, the Northstar SCI Income fund is well positioned with a yield of 8.35% and is conservatively positioned with a modified duration of 1.2. The portfolio is predominantly exposed to high quality credit with low duration, in addition to a 7.2% foreign cash exposure which offsets the duration risk and a select exposure to property with decent growth and yield characteristics.
